Mark Giangrande has been in the law library profession since 1976. Mr. Giangrande earned his B.S. degree in education from Northwestern University and his J.D. degree from IIT/Chicago-Kent College of Law. He has been a member of the Illinois State Bar Association since 1981. Mr. Giangrande received his M.L.I.S. degree from The University of Texas at Austin. He has worked at six law schools in his career, including four in the Chicago area. For much of his career he has built and managed law school computer facilities. Mr. Giangrande currently works as a legal research specialist at the DePaul University College of Law Library, and has taught advanced legal research at DePaul over the last five years. He has written many articles on various topics, including the use and management of computers in law schools and libraries, legal research and DUI litigation among others. Mr. Giangrande has also lectured regularly to groups on the use of the Internet as a tool in legal research.

A trial attorney with 20 years of experience, Mr. Miller has tried over 50 jury trials to verdict in state and federal court. Mr. Suskin is chairman of the Chicago Bar Association's Class Action Committee, former chairman and legislative liaison of the Chicago Association of Securities Law Committee and continues as an active member of the Judicial Evaluation Committee. He is a frequent author and speaker on issues relating to class actions and securities law, and is the co-author of the leading treatise on Illinois civil practice. Mr. Suskin graduated from Northwestern University, with distinction and as Phi Beta Kappa, and obtained his J.D. degree with honors from the University of Michigan Law School, where he served as editor of the *Michigan Law Review*. He is a member of the bars of Illinois, the Northern District of Illinois (including its trial bar) and the U.S. Courts of Appeals for the 4th, 6th and 7th Circuits.
